### REFLECTIONS FROM THE MANAGING DIRECTOR



Reflecting on 2024, I feel both proud and humbled by how far we have come as an organisation. This year, much of our effort was focused inward on strengthening our team and building systems that will support our long-term growth. Whether through in-house training like Jolly Phoenix for our teachers or learning under the mentorship of larger organisations, we have grown in confidence, knowledge and purpose.

Of course, the year was not without its challenges. Our limited indoor space, especially during the rainy season, meant that we had to turn some children away, something that never sits well with us. We also experienced setbacks due to inconsistent electricity supply, which affected our daily record-keeping and slowed some of our operations. Most painfully, we lost a few valued team members because we simply couldn't afford to retain them, reminders of the importance of sustainable and flexible funding.

Yet, despite these hurdles, we also witnessed remarkable achievements. One of the year's greatest highlights was receiving a generous donation of land from a kind couple to build an education centre in Makeni. This new facility will feature a modern library, a special needs unit, and additional amenities, marking a transformative step forward in our vision to provide long-term educational solutions and much-needed space for learning and growth. It's like a dream beginning to take shape.

Through out the year we continued gathering meaningful data to better understand our impact. While library visits showed a slight decline of 13% due to temporary school closures caused by a brief cholera outbreak in some parts of the country, we saw a 7.59% increase in new members. We also reached even more children through four successful outreach events, ensuring our services extended beyond our walls.

So, while 2024 came with its fair share of tests, it also reminded me of what's possible when a community pulls together.

To our partners, supporters and community...thank you! Your belief in us fuels everything we do. Here's to an even stronger 2025.



#### Access to Educational Resources

"The library has personally helped me in my education. It provides me with textbooks and sparked my interest in reading novels. Before joining the library three years ago, I only read books when I had to, but now I consistently visit the library, this has helped me expand my knowledge in different areas. When I grow up, I plan to study Agronomics, so until then, I will continue visiting the library and reading books about agriculture to better understand the subject. I would also advise the library to build a bigger space so that it can shelter more kids when it rains." -Tapiwa

### **Impact Summary**

Our programmes are essential as they are specifically designed to address the evolving needs of the young people we support. In communities lacking recreational and educational facilities, our library acts as a key community hub.

In 2024, there was a rise in parents interest in our programmes, with more testimonials noting improved academic performance among participating children. Children involved in our literacy training showed greater social and emotional confidence and were more enthusiastic about engaging in other library activities. A post-programme survey revealed that 85% of parents observed significant improvements in their children's reading habits and academic outcomes.



### About Our Programs

Over the past year, our library refined its focus into four thematic areas, guided by the evolving needs of our patrons. In addition to our Literacy and Education programme, we introduced Health & Wellness, Skills and Career Development and a Volunteer Programme.

- Successfully held holiday reading camps.


### 2024 IN NUMBERS

# PERMANENT SOLUTIONS: BUILDING MAKENI BRANCH

Looking ahead to 2025, we envision building a bigger and better self-sustaining Makeni branch to impact more children. This is part of our ongoing effort to create permanent educational solutions for children and young people. The Makeni project will address key educational challenges in underserved communities, including high illiteracy rates, poor education quality, limited access to resources, and outdated teaching methods. These issues continue to hinder children's educational and employment opportunities while contributing to inadequate learning environments caused by resource shortages and ineffective teaching practices.

In addition to the Makeni building project, we plan to implement at least one initiative in each of our new key focus areas: Health and Wellness, Skills and Career Development, and the Volunteer Programme, these are an addition to our ongoing Literacy and Education program. These efforts will help us better respond to the growing needs of our community.

Our 2025 outreach will focus on fostering partnerships with schools, educators, and various stakeholders. We believe these synergies will enable the library to reach more children and expand its impact. The goal of this outreach is to increase the visibility of our work, boost participation, and nurture strong partnerships within the communities we serve.
















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
